We Are Back To 'Sort Of' Normal

Yes, next Monday 25 May (Week 5) all students are expected to return to school unless UNWELL or have a chronic condition verified by a doctor. Our attendance process will return to normal with SMS messaging to parents to validate their child's absence. Essentially the distribution of Home Learning packs will cease.

Arriving and Departing

Following the DoE guidelines associated with the school site, emphasis has been placed on minimisation of nonessential adults on site (basically anyone not working at the school). Unless absolutely necessary, please avoid entering the school and bag rooms. Obviously social distancing whilst waiting to collect your child is mandatory and gathering restrictions are also to be adhered to.

Olla! Welcome additions to our school garden.

A big thankyou to Sally Sainsbury for her hard work in creating some wonderful terracotta watering pots 'Ollas' for our school gardens whilst working from home these past weeks.

Olla (Spanish name for pot) have been used for thousands of years in agriculture and gardening practices and are traditionally **unglazed** terracotta jugs filled with water and buried into the soil, with their necks protruding slightly. Once the porous terracotta olla is in contact with the soil, water begins to seep into the surrounding soil, directly to the rootzone of surrounding plants. This should prove to be a very effective way to keep our gardens watered.

Last Friday some of our students had fun planting the first two of these pots into the garden beds. Keep an eye out to see how our new plants grow.
